#### **Message from OAPCE**

#### Ephesians 3:14-19

For this reason I kneel before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named, that he may grant you in accord with the riches of his glory to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in the inner self, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you,

rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the holy ones what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

The busyness of our everyday lives and the ubiquitous presence of technology often pulls us in different directions and to distraction. The season of Lent permits an opportunity to slow down, to pause and reflect, and to be present in the moment for each other. As a Christian I am called to reflect on my actions, and to acknowledge with humility that there is room for me to do better. Sometimes the concept of penance is associated with guilt, shame, judgement, and maybe embarrassment. Rather as a human I am subject to err; to the influence of emotions and desires, and sometimes to the external influence of others.

The New Year that precedes Lent is a time that many of us set new intentions and resolutions. Lent grants us the space to reflect more deeply on our purpose and to let go of our regrets so that we can more effectively fulfill our intentions while being present for one another, living our lives to the fullest, and sharing our gifts with others along our travails. It is a time to model empathy and compassion for our children and loved ones, and to recognize God's great gift and infinite capacity in His love for us through Jesus. His love and example, gives us the strength we need to persevere and endure. When we follow his lead and extend our love to our neighbor, sometimes by simply lending an ear, we ease the burdens of those around us, erstwhile building the connections that support our own resilience.

So for forty days let us slow down, retreat into our shells, to reflect, recharge, and renew like the tortoise before leaping forward into the swing of things like the hare!

### Message from the Liaison Bishop

Dear members of the Ontario Association of Parents in Catholic Education (OAPCE),

From Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday, the whole Church is living the Season of Lent. The word "Lent" translates the Latin word Quadragesima, which simply means forty. It is a reminder of the forty years the people travelled in the wilderness between its liberation from Egypt and its entry in the promised land. Most importantly, it reminds us that, right after his baptism, "Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights..." (Matt. 4:1-2). As followers of Jesus, forty days before Easter, we walk in his footsteps, led up by the Spirit and learn from him how to overcome temptations.

Lent is a time of penance and prayer. Most importantly it is also a time of preparation for Baptism. The Sunday Readings of Lent in Year A are oriented towards the main symbols of our Christian Baptism. Like every year, on the first Sunday we read the Temptations Gospel, then the Transfiguration Gospel on the second Sunday. The three other Sundays are oriented towards baptism. With the Samaritan woman, we contemplate Jesus as the source that brings us to eternal life: "The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life" (John 4:14). With the man born blind we are reminded that Jesus is the "light of the world" (John 9:5). Since those two signs, water and light, were given to us at baptism, with Lazarus we confess that Jesus is "the resurrection and the life" (John 11:25).

As Catholic parents, we have a responsibility towards our children, whom we presented to Baptism. We committed ourselves to teach them the Gospel. Through our daily lives, we can show them what it means to be "baptized in Christ." The Season of Lent is a time when we take seriously our commitment to drink from the well that is Christ, to allow his light to shine in our lives by considering ourselves "dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:11)

May this Lent 2023 remind us of God's grace and allow us to take seriously our baptismal commitment. The season of Lent will thus prepare us to celebrate the Paschal Mystery. A good Lent and a Happy and Holy Easter to you all!




# ADVOCATE FROM THE REGIONS

#### Carlo Acutis: A Millennial in Paradise (2021) by Fr. Will Conquer



In each generation, heroes of the faith, whom the Church recognizes as saints, emerge. There are many characteristics that they have in common, but none of these individuals thus far have used cell phones, played PlayStation video games, or searched for information on Google.

This is the story of a young "computer geek" named Carlo Acutis, who created a website cataloguing every reported Eucharistic miracle in the world before dying of leukemia at the age of 15. He was beatified in October 2020 after a healing miracle was attributed to his intercession. Since then, solemn crowds have been filing past the exposed relics of the blessed youth in Assisi's Church of Santa Maria Maggiore.

The book highlights how Carlo embraced his Catholic faith as a boy, developed the virtues necessary to live a Christ-centered life in a secular society, interacted with his teenage friends to help guide them, and how he responded to his illness and suffering with grace. It is an ideal read for parents, teens, and families to learn together about how a young person from an affluent background can be a model of goodness, beauty, and holiness.
